There has not been a lot going on in the council for the last few months. We had our World Council business zoom on July 5th where there were a few topics of discussion. There has not been much to report for any of the committees. As usual the Alumni Committee has the largest attendance and they are usually discussing a number of things. All of the World Council members stay pretty busy in our areas, there just has not been a lot of actual committee work recently. For the Chapters & Associations committee we have kind of switched gears. We had previously been gathering data on how different areas run their housing services committees. From what I have gathered the way we operate in Topeka and other areas of Kansas is quite a bit different than other areas. The HSC in other states is much more hands-on and almost takes on a more proactive role than chapter does. Even though many of these states operate in a similar fashion, they are all somewhat different. Due to the large scope of this project and minimal attendance on the zoom meetings we have decided to put this project on hold and focus on a more attainable goal. Our focus now is to review our literature and suggest changes that could be made. We all know that we are supposed to use the term EES instead of rent and expel instead of evict, plus a number of other verbiage that we are told to use. However there are many places in our literature that still have this terminology. This has been discussed a few times at the summit and I have had many people reach out to me and point out different items that should be changed. Our current project is to start with the Oxford House Manual and find all of these potential changes that could be made and make notes of the exact page and paragraph. Our idea is that once all of this is done we can turn in our notes to OHI and it will be super simple to go through the manual and make corrections. Once we finish with the house manual we will continue with other Oxford House publications.

For resolutions we have 2 to present at the world convention to be voted on.

1. Be it resolved, leases should be reviewed with new members upon acceptance.
2. Be it resolved, each area should consider organizing a reentry committee.

I have had lots of people reach out to me about the potential online banking resolution but it is not going to happen this year. We have made a QR code linked to a survey and the council members will individually have houses scan the code and take the survey to gather data on how houses are already doing their banking. We all know, including OHI, that there are houses that already pay their bills online, whether its because they have to or just for convenience is what we are trying to gather data on. Since there is already a resolution saying that we are not supposed to be doing this, the survey will be anonymous.

I hope everyone is getting as excited for the World Convention as I. I know we will all learn a lot and have a great time up in the mountains of Colorado.

FORA Report – State Association – July 11, 2026

Friends of Recovery Association (FORA) continues to strengthen recovery support efforts throughout Kansas by expanding recovery housing, supporting Oxford Houses, building community partnerships, and creating opportunities for individuals in recovery to succeed. As we continue to grow, FORA remains committed to transparency, accountability, and working alongside the Kansas State Association to ensure Oxford Houses remain strong and sustainable for years to come.

Founders Loan

First, I want to thank everyone who has continued to make payments on their Founders Loans. Every payment made helps create opportunities for the next Oxford House to open somewhere else in Kansas.

However, we've noticed an increasing number of houses that have stopped making payments because current members believe they shouldn't be responsible since they weren't living in the house when the loan was originally received.

I'd like to remind everyone that Founders Loans belong to the house, not the individuals who happened to be living there when the loan was issued.

One of the foundations of Oxford House is accountability. Every member benefits from the sacrifices and responsibilities of those who came before them, just as future members will benefit from the decisions made today. When a house accepts a Founders Loan, that obligation becomes part of the house's ongoing responsibility.

If houses stop repaying these loans simply because membership changes, the program becomes unsustainable. Those repayments are what allow FORA to continue helping open new Oxford Houses throughout Kansas.

We ask every house to take ownership of its responsibilities, honor its commitments, and continue paying forward the opportunity that was once provided to them.

State Association Discussion – Member Involvement

One area of growing concern is the significant level of non-involvement across our state.

FORA has discussed several possible ideas internally, but we want to hear from the Kansas State Association.

Rather than assuming we know the best solution, we'd like to ask:

- What do you believe contributes to the lack of involvement?
- What barriers are members experiencing?
- What ideas do you have to encourage greater participation?
- How can FORA support the State Association in increasing engagement while still respecting the traditions of Oxford House?

This is not about criticizing anyone. It is about recognizing that strong Oxford Houses depend on active participation. State Association, Chapters, and FORA all exist to support recovery, but they can only be effective when members choose to be involved.

We look forward to having an open discussion and hearing your thoughts.

Chapter Services East Report:

While it is appropriate to periodically update our rules, we must always consider future members and ensure rules are never manipulated for personal gain.

To that end, implementing a "cap" on how far a member can fall behind on EES without consequences is highly discouraged. Such a rule inadvertently permits members to stay just under the limit. If multiple members utilize this, it can cause severe financial distress to the house. Our manual clearly states that non-payment of EES is a form of disruptive behavior and consistently staying behind falls into this category.

Please remember that our first fundamental rule is that we must be democratically run. Everyone's voice matters.

It has been busy these last few months. I attended Chapter 5's meeting and was given the opportunity to replicate the Oxford House model. I also attended Chapter 12's meeting via Zoom in June, and I will be attending their meeting in person this month.

Chapter 3 has been very active in the Wichita area. We are encouraging members to visit other chapters and their houses. We see a community starting to grow. We have supported fundraising events to send members to World & 4TK. As well we are working closely with our recovery community to help outside of Oxford. Progress is happening although with any progress there comes learning and growth opportunities.

Late last month, Chapter 3 was alerted to an issue with Oxford House Waco by a federal probation officer. The probation officer had gone to the house on more than one occasion to check in with their client. They were told once that person was at work, and this may have been confusion between 2 members with the same first

name. The last visit the probation officer asked a direct question to the president at that time "Does this person still live here?" He said he was not sure if he could provide that information. The probation officer was upset and seen the president as lying, due to the actions of this house they stated they may have to reconsider sending their clients to Oxford Houses in our area that are on federal probation. After the chapter was informed of this, we suggested the House have an emergency meeting. They did the following night, and our housing services chair and state housing service west attended. The day after that emergency meeting we had our monthly chapter meeting. We discussed this issue at length. The house had written a letter of apology and was having their weekly house meeting the next morning.

Based on their house's actions having the ability of affecting other Oxford Houses, the chapter seen this as a violation of tradition 5 and placed the house on a behavior contract. We have worked closely with Oxford House Waco and the next day the House placed their president on a behavior contract and had him step down as president. The former president also wrote a personal apology letter to this probation officer. I have spoken to the probation officer on several occasions since the behavior contracts, and they stated they are glad action was taken to correct this from being a problem going forward.

Chapter 3 is committed to supporting all its houses as they grow and learn and foster productive relationships with the community. We would like to ask that this be communicated to all our houses that provide information to properly verified law enforcement and probation officers as to whether a person lives in our house (when asked) and their move-in and move-out dates are essential to do their jobs. Any information in addition to this would need to be decided by the house. Finally, there was an email sent to our state chair & Brian Holmes about a member that was at Oxford House Barnes with concerns they have about that house. We are gathering information and will be discussing this at our Housing Services meeting on Tuesday, July 14th.

One of our greatest challenges came when Oxford House White received a 60-day notice

that the property was being sold. While this could have created uncertainty for the members, it instead became an opportunity to put the Oxford House principles into action. Through a coordinated effort between the chapter, FORA, and the members of Oxford House White, every resident was successfully transitioned into a new home in less than 40 days. The process demonstrated what is possible when we work together with a shared purpose and remember that no Oxford House stands alone.

Chapter 4 also celebrated the successful reopening of Oxford House Bryant. Thanks to the commitment of our chapter and the support of neighboring houses, Bryant reached full occupancy in less than a month and has quickly become a stable, established part of our chapter. Watching a house grow from an empty building into a thriving Oxford House has been a reminder that recovery is strongest when we invest in the future of others. Our chapter remains committed to the larger Oxford House community as well. We voted to send 10 members to the World Convention, bringing our total Chapter 4 representation to 13 attendees, including Buster, Chris, and myself. We believe participation beyond the local level strengthens our leadership, broadens our perspective, and allows us to bring new ideas and renewed enthusiasm back to Kansas.

Fellowship continues to be a priority throughout our chapter. Oxford House Merriam recently hosted a Fourth of July unity event, welcoming members who wanted a place to celebrate together. Opportunities like these have strengthened the bonds between our houses and reminded our members of the values of what Oxford can bring. As a chapter, we recognize that we are currently in a rebuilding phase. Several of our houses are newly established, while others are experiencing significant turnover as members transition into the next chapter of their lives. Although change can present challenges, it also reflects the success of the Oxford House model. Our focus remains on supporting new members, developing future leaders, strengthening our houses, and preserving the democratic, self-supporting principles that have made Oxford House successful for decades. Chapter 4 is optimistic about the future. We will continue to serve one another, uphold the Oxford House Traditions, and work together so that every person seeking recovery -gets the opportunity to find not just a house, but a home.
